Name of the Program: Ph.D. in Buddhist Studies and Civilization

Duration: 3 year (6 Semesters)

Minimum Qualification for Admission: Postgraduate Degree with minimum 55% for Gen/OBCs and 50%

for SCs/STs is required to be eligible to apply for the admission. However, the admission will be based on the merit and candidates will be selected as per the guidelines of the UGC and availability of vacant seats under the faculty members. Reservations in the admission will be fulfilled as per the

Government policy.

Total Required Credits: 20 credits are required from the coursework.
