University also offers courses such as Human Values & Buddhist Ethics and Buddhist Moral Values and Contemporary Society for students at UG and PG levels respectively. Intellectual Property Rights, Biosafety, Bioethics, and meditation are also offered as compulsory Subject to all the students at least once during Int.

- The Gautam Buddha University received an approval in principle by Ministry of Micro, Small & Medium Enterprises, Government of India, on 06.04.2021 by the order number F.No.033(10)/Inc/7th PMAC/2020-21.
- Incubation Centre had organised an Idea Generation Contest, in which 24 entries of new ideas were received from the students and alumni of Gautam Buddha University. After careful scrutiny of these ideas sixteen teams were interviewed and ask to submit a Detailed Project Report, by the Incubation Committee. A total of four Detailed Project

Reports have been received by the Incubation Centre. As soon as the University physically opens for students the process for incubating these companies will be undertaken.
