PROCEDURE FOR ADMISSION TO M.Phil./Ph.D. PROGRAMME

(In accordance with UGC Regulations dated 05.5.2016)

- (5.1) There shall be a common Entrance Test for M.Phil. and Ph.D. programme to be conducted by the University. The Entrance Test shall be qualifying with qualifying marks as 50%. The syllabus of the Entrance Test shall consist of 50% of research methodology and 50% shall be subject-specific.
- (5.2) An interview shall be organized where the candidates are required to discuss their research interest/area through a presentation before a duly constituted committee. The interview shall also consider the following aspects:
 - a. the candidate possesses the competence for the proposed research;
 - b. the research work can be suitably undertaken at the University;
 - the proposed area of research can contribute to new/additional knowledge.
- (5.3) For all written entrance test qualified candidates, the merit list (out of 100 marks), will be prepared as per following criteria:
 - (i) 50% weightage will be given to the marks obtained in written entrance test;
 - (ii) 25% weightage will be given on the above three criteria listed in point (5.2) above;
 - (iii) 25% weightage will be given to interview.

For candidates, exempted from written entrance test, the merit list will be prepared on the basis of points listed at 5.3(ii) & 5.3(iii) above, scaled up to 100 marks.

Remark: Admission in M.Phil.(Clinical Psychology) shall be in accordance with the RCI guidelines.
